



Why We Switched

The Dewey Decimal System:

- A nineteenth century view of the world
- Not easy to browse
- Not easy to shelve
- Not intuitive for our young patrons





The Road to Metis

Questions that informed our process

- Can we fix Dewey?
- What alternatives are there?
 - WordThink, Color System, BISAC, etc.
- Can we apply this to our collection?
- How can we ensure that the new system is inclusive?



Why Metis

- Created by the Ethical Cultural School in 2011 as a replacement for Dewey
- Language-based
- Flexible & adaptable
- Fosters patron independence & agency
- Easier to shelve (6 out of 6 pages agree)



How Metis Works

Primary Category

26 categories, each represented by a single letter

G. = Machines & Structures

Secondary Category

Further specifies the topic as needed

G. Transport


Tertiary Category


Breaks down the topic even further (but only if needed)


G. Transport Trains

Metis on the Shelf

- Shelved alphabetically, first by call number and then by title
- Catalog shows updated call numbers
- Currently only used in the Kids Corner







Supporting Browsability

- Flow of topics was designed to put related categories together
- Promoting natural discoverability and patron browsing was a part of our planning process
- Primary audience was considered when determining where to place particular items or sections

Making Popular Topics Discoverable

- Based on commonly asked for topics at the Reference Desk
- Intended to make popular topics browsable
- Currently have 11 topics represented with shelf talkers
- Visuals accompany bold Arial font
- Reflect secondary and tertiary categories





Accessibility

- Consultation with Detroit Disability Power
- Considered verbiage
- Signage
 - Primary Category shelf talkers and Secondary Category popular topic call-outs
 - Font choice
 - Color contrast
 - Use of graphics

Getting our ducks in a row


- How do we create and print over 7,200 new spine labels?

Now & Looking Forward

Day to Day Use

- Makes reference work faster
- Increases browsability
- Easier to track gaps in collection

Collection maintenance

- Materials relabeled as they are returned
- New materials get fresh labels according to the reference binder

Future Plans

- New categories added & language changed as needed
- Assessing best way to use Ferndale-Metis in international collection and YA
