

What is MiTracking?

The MiTracking Program gathers existing data about environmental hazards and health problems that might be related to the environment. MiTracking makes it easier to learn about possible connections between the environment and health by making this data and information available in one online location.

Everyone, from citizens to public health professionals, can easily run data queries on the MiTracking data portal. Data query results are provided in tables, charts, and maps that can be downloaded, saved, and printed.



What can you do with MiTracking?

- Find information on certain environmental hazards and linked illnesses.
- Search for state and county data by geographic region and time period.
- Compare data across race, age, and gender for some measures.
- Select and download customized tables, charts, and maps.
- Discover trends and measure progress over time.
- Create greater awareness of environmental health concerns in communities.
- Use the data to inform public health actions, programs, policies, and research.

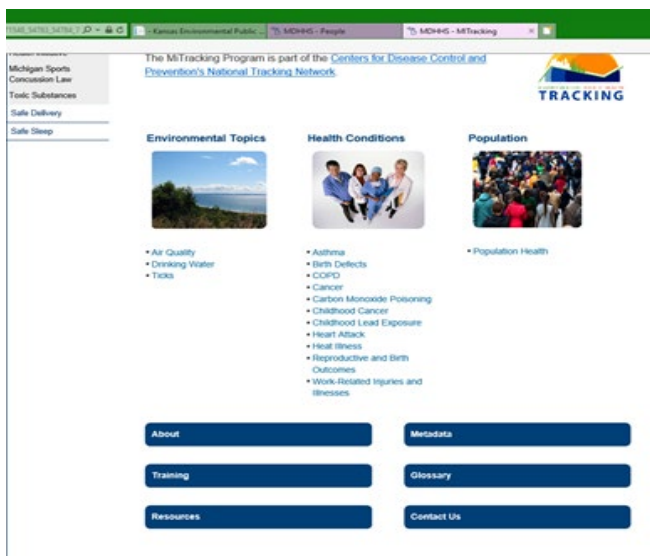

Compare Measures

- The blue **Compare Measures** button at the top of the page compares two measures through table, chart, or map results.
- The **Toggle** Button switches between right and left queries. The green arrow indicates which side is being altered.
- Hide sides by clicking **Hide left side** or **Hide right side**
